The 2019 Report of the Cleveland Photographic Workshop's Director

The story begins with a phone call from photographer Laura D'Alessandro sometime in mid 2018.

"Hi Herb, I'm back after ten years in New Orleans. For seven years I was involved as a volunteer with PhotoNOLA, the New Orleans Annual Festival of Photography. Since I've been home I've attended every opening in Cleveland that has hung a photograph. We should do something photography oriented in Cleveland," to which I replied, "Call me when you have a plan."

A year later, Laura invited me to a meeting at Tremont's famous Civilization Cafe. Waiting at the table was media savant and photographer Jim Szudy. We sat the back corner for a two and half hour a non-stop impromptu conversation. Walking into the February sunshine we looked at each with confidence; having created, and launched, the first annual Cleveland Photo Fest.

The first step was to contact galleries, artspaces and committed supporters. Our Team organized six exhibitions in three galleries: The Good Goat Gallery in Lakewood, the Foothills Galleries of the Photo – Succession in Cleveland Heights, and Prama Artspace in Parma. We projected two exhibitions at each facility. We would launch in September and October of 2019.

The 2019 Report of the Cleveland Photographic Workshop's Director - continued

Steven Litt's article "Organizers put focus on inaugural Cleveland Photo Fest in the Fall" appeared in the May 5th Sunday Art's Section of the Plain Dealer. That afternoon, I received an email from Dave Eggert, owner of Neo-Pro Imaging. 'Herb', he said, 'I want to get behind the Cleveland Photo Fest.' Dave graciously offered to print our exhibition catalogue, and has since been our most ardent supporter. We had just landed our first major sponsor.

Fast forward ten months to November of 2019. With the invaluable enthusiasm of our Team, our volunteers, our sponsors, our supporters and the incredible photo enthusiasts of North East Ohio and beyond, we:

- Exhibited over 150 North East Ohio photographers, engaged a few random poets, and received the blessings of an itinerant monk.
- We showed photographers from Bismarck, Exeter, Rochester, Bethesda
- Toronto, London, Brussels, Abu Dhabi and Kerala (southern India).
- In 16 Artspaces
- That hosted 21 exhibitions.
- In addition, we sponsored numerous gallery talks, presentations of historical interest and hands on activities.

We have had, to put it mildly, one helluva first year.

Transformations:

a series of magnificently printed archival pigment portraits from surrealistically deteriorated film negatives, was the September exhibition at Cleveland Height's **Foothill Galleries of the Photo-Succession**. *Transformations* is the work of Dr. Unni Krishnan Pulikkal of Kerala, India. Dr. Pulikkal's exhibition showcased portraits from negatives given to him by associates who had emptied a photographer's studio, abandoned for six decaying decades. The haunting digitally reconstructed images are a vision of faces resurrected from the past.




Orange Art Center, Pepper Pike, Ohio, presented Masters of Portrait Photography
